She said, "In the 1970s, the Buffalo Evening News reported that the West Seneca Developmental Center had the best record in the state for moving individuals from the Developmental Center to living situations in the community. Remember that was over 30 years ago, and with time the community residential placements just kept getting better and better – with more and more opportunities for all types of living situations – in group homes, in apartments, with families, with roommates or totally on your own. The evolution of the system has been incredible." She continued

her speech with saying, "Most importantly, we are here today to celebrate the incredible triumphs of the men and women we are honored to provide services to. There are many people here today whose journey in life has taken them through the West Seneca Developmental Center and now into the many communities of Western New York and beyond. We are here to take inspiration from the past, while preparing for the future. We are on the verge of a new service system in NYS. DDAWNY is hopeful that our unique partnership among the people we serve, their families, OPWDD, the Western New York DDSO and the Western New York community will allow us to continue this incredible journey to the next level of excellence."
